We make every effort to ensure donor dollars are being used efficiently by utilizing volunteer resources, sponsorships and in-kind donations.


#### IN 2023:



## **CORE COMMITMENTS**

Greater Mankato Area United Way's core commitments are to secure resources, convene the community, and connect people and organizations to resources. United Way secures resources by soliciting individuals and businesses throughout the region during the annual campaign. In 2023, approximately 5,000 individuals donated through workplace campaigns or other personal giving, while approximately 180 companies pledged a corporate gift. By receiving a total of \$2,571,986.49 in donation pledges to the 2023 campaign, United Way provided funding to 55 programs across 38 nonprofit agencies in 2023. Of these programs, 34 received additional "one-time funding" allocations in Fall 2023.

#### **BASIC NEEDS**

United Way stabilizes families in need and gives them tools for success. The focus of Basic Needs supports advancing the common good by providing basic needs like food, clothing, shelter, and emergency services. This focus area also supports programs to increase self-sufficiency through building systems of support for individuals and families. These programs served 3,877 people in 2023. In addition, the 2-1-1 help network served 720 individuals and the Get Connected platform and Week of Action connected hundreds of volunteers to needs.



United Way helps people live healthy, independent lives. The focus of Health supports increased independence through building systems of support for older individuals, support for individuals with disabilities to live their lives fully engaged in our communities, and supporting vulnerable families and individuals by providing them tools to maintain all aspects of healthy living. These programs served 11,445 people in 2023. In addition, the collaborative Project Community Connect resource event served more than 680.

#### **EDUCATION**

The focus area of Education is structured to building systems of support for parents and young children to ensure that all children are ready for kindergarten, ensure youth have healthy growth and development opportunities and that youth have access to quality youth development programs that foster positive experiences. These programs served 17,812 youth in 2023. Examples of other educational initiatives include the United Way Fourth-Grade Book Project, which served 1,600 individuals, and the annual Reading Festival, which served more than 600.







## COMMUNITY IMPACT

Since 1931, Greater Mankato Area United Way has served as the trusted connector for organizations, volunteers, businesses, community members, donors, local leaders, media, and others to improve the lives of all ages. United Way convenes the community to identify needs, bring awareness to topics, and facilitate action around community issues. In 2023, United Way convened the community around literacy, sex trafficking prevention, suicide prevention, substance use advocacy, youth mental health and other issues. Community committees supporting these issues made it possible for United Way and its partners to make a difference in our region. In the 2023-24 school year, the Youth Mental Health Navigator program expanded to four navigators, encompassing all 13 school districts in Greater Mankato Area United Way's service area. Mental health advocate Emma Benoit shared her transformative story, impacting thousands of regional students.

In 2023, Greater Mankato Area United Way's early childhood development initiatives included Success by Six forums. Literacy initiatives included the Fourth-Grade Book Project, in partnership with the Olseth Family Foundation, which provided 1,600 books to regional students. The Books for Kids program, in partnership with Capstone, provided nearly 25,000 books children in the four-county area.

Greater Mankato Area United Way also connected people and organizations to resources through tools such as Get Connected, an online volunteer management system, as well as 2-1-1, a community helpline. United Way played a key role in collaborative initiatives such as coat drives, school supply drives, Week of Action service projects, and more. United Way serves as the fiscal agent for Project Community Connect, an annual free resource expo for community members.

United Way had great community participation in signature events such as the Men's Event, Women with Heart, Fire & Ice and other activities. At the annual Women with Heart luncheon, United Way welcomed keynote speaker Dr. Nancy Fitzsimons of MNSU to share on the concept of "upstream," which focuses on addressing the cause of the cause in community issues. Formerly called Emerging Leaders United, the group Engaged Leaders United expanded to include ages 50 and under. It continued to be a key connection for donors to grow in their philanthropic interests. The Always United group focused on engaging retirees, while Grow United shared United Way's impact with rural/farming communities.






